Radio Atlantis are announcing a listener's Night-out. It is to be held on 24th August from 9pm to 2am and the venue is the PAVILION CLUB, Wolstenholmé Square, Liverpool which is handy for Central Station. There will be no entry fee for listeners and buffet food available. The station will be featuring a computerised Light and Sound disco, appearance by a rock star, and there will be many prizes on offer.

Central Radio's listener's night out will take place the following Wednesday, 29th August, at the OAKFIELD HOTEL, Oakfield Road, Anfield, Liverpool, and not as reported last week. It will feature the station disco and possibly a few surprise packets. As a normal pub venue, there is no admission charge and it takes place from 7pm to 10:30pm

CHANNEL FIVE 1242kHz: 23, Rice Hey Road, Egremont, Wallasey, Merseyside L44 ODX.

Seem to have signed-on slightly late on Sunday, and were not heard at noon.

The station possibly had transmitter problems as the signal seemed to be weaker than the normal, but was not measured. Later in the evening, speech was barely heard (during the Frank Xerox Show?) and close-down time was not noted. When heard, the station appear to have followed their normal format with all DJs doing 1½ hours each.

STORETON COMPUNITY RADIO 1026kHz: 23, The Meadow, Woodchurch Estate, Birkenhead, Mersey—The station appear to have changed their hours this week. side L49 8HX. They have not been heard 6am-8am, but seem to have been signing-on at the latter time. To make up their hours, they are announcing a 4am close-down, and they are also announcing a few programmes by new DJs who have not yet been heard. Andy Sloan, the former "early-bird" now seems to have been moved to a slot just after midnight.

RADIO ATLANTIS 936kHz: 150, Rake Lane, Wallasey, Merseyside L45 lJW.

Rick Dane, Steve Bishop and Steve Tyler still seem to be working extremely long hours to keep the station on the air for its scheduled weekday and Saturday programming, although listening observations suggest that they are using "continuous music" tapes at times. Saturday programming extended beyond 6pm, but close-down time was not noted. The station followed their usual schedule on Sunday, but programming was extended beyond 9pm, with Steve Bishop being heard (till midnight?). The FM frequency was heard on Wednesday night, and also all-day Sunday, but seemed to be much weaker than normal.

RADIO MERSEYWAVES 94.8MHz FM; 23, Birnam Road, Puolton, Wallasey, Merseyside L44 9AY.

The station signed-on at 6pm on Sunday, and featured sign-on by Bert Williams 6pm - 6:10pm; Tina Christian 6:10pm-7:10pm; Bert Williams 7:10pm- 9pm; Paul Jay 9pm-11pm; then Bert Williams to an un-heard sign-off. The station was also heard on parallel 1179kHz, with good reception, although Bert Williams still seems dis-satisfied with the Tx.

RADIO ELENORE 1179kHz: 16, Stockbridge Street, Anfield, Liverpool L5 6PB

This station appears to have been fulfilling its schedule, but Friday operations are hard to monitor. This weekend, the regular schedule has still been somewhat disturbed by the holidays of the regular DJs, notably Mark Wright, who had Garry Allen 'standing-in' for him on Saturday, and Simon Smithies on Sunday. From announcements, it would seem that the latter has become a regular DJ on the station.

CENTRAL RADIO INTERNATIONAL 1386kHz: 18, Glynne Street, Orrell, Bootle, Merseyside L20 6DF

The station seem to have operated on both Saturday and Sunday between 10am and 8pm, although sign-on time on Saturday was not noted and the DJ line-up also went un-noted. Some of the new DJs remain un-heard, although Brian Grant is well known from previous stints with the station. Reception this weekend has not been very good. Signal is quite strong, but modulation leaves a lot to be desired, appearing to be a bit "muffled" for most of the time.

STATION "M" INTERNATIONAL

This station tends to get overlocked as they have not been on the air for quite a few weeks, and I tend not to listen on FM unles I expect to hear something as a result of announcements made on parallel AM frequencies. This weekend, an extended listening session of FM failed to reveal them.
