

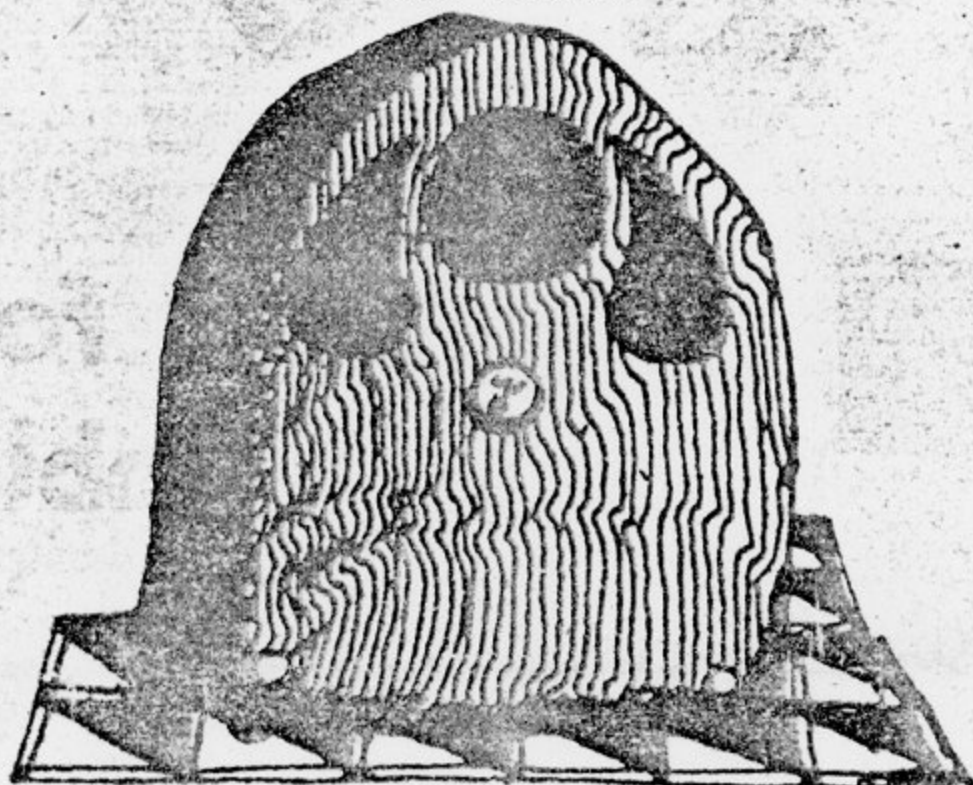

WELCOME TO EDITION NUMBER EIGHT OF 'SOUNDS ALTERNATIVE' (IRELAND'S ONLY FREE COMMERCIAL RADIO MAGAZINE - AS WE ALWAYS SAY!!!) WE WOULD LIKE TO APOLOGISE FOR THE NON-APPEARANCE OF THE MAY/JUNE EDITION OF THE MAG. 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THE HISTORY OF DUBLIN FREE RADIO(PART TWO).....

Meanwhile, other pirate stations had emerged. Radio Valleri began in 1972. On August 3rd 1975 Capitol Radio started broadcasting. Capitol had been raided but had shown quite a degree of ingenuity in disposing of their transmitting equipment and the Post Office went away empty handed. Capitol disappeared in 1976 and 1977, and returned in 1978, run largely by the original people. By the end of 1977, Radio Dublin was by far the most popular of the pirates, although ARD, which started broadcasting that year, run by Davitt Kelly, Declan Matthews (from Venessa) and Mark Story, was gaining a considerable audience. Don Moore, ousted from Radio Dublin offered ARD a permanent location in Cabra, which was accepted. After this a series of incidents occurred between Radio Dublin and ARD: sabotaged aerials, break-ins and finally a head on collision between Eamon Cooke's White Jaguar and Don Moore's car.

At this stage advertising began to play an important part in the transmissions. ARD was the first station to offer commercials at £2.00 a spot. Now it stands at seven times that price. It was at this time that Bernard Llewellyn, the owner of Anya TV shops, became interested. Llewellyn bought 50% of the station from Moore (the station's founders were not consulted). ARD moved to Belvedere Place early in 1978 and began broadcasting seven days a week. The station limped along through raids, a series of bad transmitters and disputes which has led to few people remaining with the station for very long. This has changed over the past couple of months with the station attempting to run a serious local service. At this time Don Moore's involvement with ARD is greatly reduced. He now had interests in two rural stations - one in Roscommon, the other in Mullingar.

Radio Dublin, which had started seven day week transmissions at Christmas 1977, proved increasingly popular with listeners who hadn't heard continuous pop music since the days of Radio Caroline in 1966/67. By April 1978 advertising revenue was flowing into the station, while disc-jockeys James Dillion, Gerry Campbell, John Paul and Denis Murray were becoming personalities. Many factories relayed the station through their P.A. systems. In April while Eamon Cooke was on holidays a backer had been found for a new station, Big D, and the split was made. Allegations of child molesting and sabotaging the transmitter were made. Both sides probably had good reason to be bitter. Big D did not replace Radio Dublin, but it took a very large proportion of its audience, which remained loyal to the Disc Jockeys rather than the station. If it was their intention to sabotage Cook's transmitter, they did not do a good job: Radio Dublin was back on the air within hours and back to normal within days. Since then, Big D has broadcast 24 hours a day, continuously despite raids, as a co-operative, attracting a large number of their Disc Jockeys from ARD as well as the original Radio Dublin team.

When legislation does finally arrive, and many think this will not happen before March or April next year, few of the stations will continue, although Radio Dublin, which is still based in Eamon Cooke's terrace house in Inchicore could do so by returning to the time when it was on a shoestring. ARD, in its Georgian building with its expenses of well over £1,000 a week, could definitely not continue without advertising revenue. As to whether Big D or Capital could survive, that is debatable. Whatever does happen the pirates' contribution lies in the fact that they have shown two needs: Firstly a need for local community based radio; Secondly a need for a national music radio service. The Minister must now recognise their contribution and provide an adequate replacement before he removes them.

POSTSCRIPT TO ABOVE ARTICLE.....

Laws prohibiting unlicensed broadcasting are now in an advanced stage of preparation. These laws will also make provision for the setting up of the necessary machinery to issue licences to groups interested in providing local commercial radio services to areas around the country.


BOYNESIDE RADIO ON 225 METRES.....

Boyneside Radio (or LRD) has been broadcasting since late November 1978 from Donaghy's Mill, a grand five storey fortress on the banks of the Boyne in the heart of Drogheda. The first days of LRD (Local Radio Drogheda) were very successful despite the fact that the transmitter power was only 9 watts! In January 1979 the station increased power to 50 watts and a couple of weeks later to 160 watts using a 'Redifon' (ex. IBA) 2kW transmitter (not properly loaded to aerial). The station suffered several technical problems in May, including an unsuccessful P.O. raid, but despite this and the arrival of RTE Radio 2, the loyalty of LRD listeners still remains.

In July, the station again increased power to 400 watts which eliminated all technical problems and today that station can be heard quite clearly within a 45 mile radius of Drogheda and also on the West Coast of England and Wales. The station staff includes 10 full time D.J's 2 Newsreaders, with a full time NUJ newseditor and several sports correspondents.

Station timetable: 7.30am 'The rise & Shine Show' - with David Brown - David worked with RTE Community Radio and hosts the morning show. 10.00am News Headlines followed by the 'Eric Vaughan Show' - Eric formerly of Radio Dublin, Big D Radio and Radio Carousel, talks to housewives and keeps them entertained. 12 noon 'The Lunchtime Special' with Gavan Duffy. 1.15pm National & Local News. 1.20pm 'Lunchtime Special' part 2. 2.00pm 'Afternoon Delight' with Heady Eddy - features 'Memory Lane Time', 'Old Folks Corner' and the 'Birthday Call'. 4.30pm the 'Scenearound Show' with Eric Vaughan and Aine Ni Guidher - includes 'Community Calender'. 6.00pm 'Main News Round Up', followed by the 'Teatime Show' with Seamus Mc Kenna - Seamus features a selection of Rock 'N' Roll music, plus competitions and phone-ins. 8.00pm to 9.00pm (Mon, Wed & Fri) 'New Wave' with Tony Clayton-Lee. 8.00 to 9.00pm (Tue, Thurs & weekends) 'Country Convoy' with Paraic Roden - featuring the best of Irish & International Country Music.

Weekend programmes include a Top 30 show on Sundays and live broadcasts. Boyneside Radio 225 metres has a chain link of operators and controllers, with the ambition to pioneer Local Radio. ==FRC-IRELAND wishes them every success==.

WHAT HAPPENED TO RTE ?

RTE or Radio Eireann or 2RN as it was then known was formed out of necessity because of the fear of English based companies coming into Ireland to operate a broadcasting system. RTE Radio 2 also came on the air through necessity because of the growth of illegal radio stations. RTE Radio 2 is a total music station but in the book 'Broadcasting in Ireland' by Desmond Fisher, he states: "RTE sees such a second radio service as permitting more balanced and comprehensive programming, ensuring a better service for minorities (including adult education) and providing an outlet for further artistic and creative endeavour".

The quote continues: "Plans are advanced for five or six additional local radio stations on M.F. The first two such stations will be Radio Shannonside serving the Limerick/Shannon region and Radio Dublin for the Dublin area".

Where are these local stations today ? In the inceneratorator I expect! And what about adult education on RTE Radio 2 ? There are more educational programmes on ARD (Paul Vincent's quiz show for example) than on RTE Radio 2.

In an 'In Dublin' article on local radio, Eugene Murray (RTE Features & Current Affairs producer) stated: "We have a studio ready in Ballsbridge to start a local community radio station in Dublin." I live in the Ballsbridge area and never heard such nonsense unless RTE have a secret hideout (probably to stop P.O. officials raiding them after ARD's claim that RTE was illegal!!!)

The pirates have done more for RTE than the converse. Apart from providing competition, these stations have provided nearly half the staff for RTE Radio 2. Producers, (E.G. Robbie Irwin co-founder of Radio Vanessa) and D.J's alike have all started their broadcasting activities with pirates (RTE save money because they didn't have to train staff).

Then there is the fact that Radio Na Gaeltachta began as a pirate until RTE took over the station and polished up the local presenters who were working with the station. This was mentioned by Bernadette Ni Fhlathartha in the above mentioned quotation from 'In Dublin'.

It took RTE many years to get a VHF service on the air and it cost the station a lot of money whereas Big D Radio is now broadcasting on VHF and it cost the taxpayer nothing and was done relatively quickly and effectively.

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SOUTHSIDE RADIO, STATION HISTORY.....

Southside Radio commenced broadcasting on the 18th of December 1978. Transmissions were from 4.00pm to 1.00am weekdays and from 1.00pm to 1.00am Saturdays and Sundays. Initially the signal could be heard over a three mile radius, but this was to be later increased. Due to popular demand, the broadcasting times were extended from 11.00am to 1.00pm and soon a large percentage of the Bray population were listening to the station. However, on the 25th of April '79 Southside Radio was raided by the P.O. - backed up by 8 Gardaí. The P.O. officials were unable to gain immediate entry to the station, and in the intervening time (15 minutes) the staff were able to dismantle the transmitter. No equipment was taken.

In June 1979, a new transmitter was installed which improved reception considerably in the Bray and surrounding areas. On the 9th of June, the station owner Mr. Paul Nicholas was informed by four members of the staff that they were taking over the station. Thinking that there would be trouble, Mr. Nicholas removed the transmitter that night. During that same night, the stays supporting the 60 foot transmitting mast were cut and all the equipment was removed.

Southside Radio was off the air for almost 2½ weeks whilst repairs were being carried out. When transmissions recommenced, the signal was poor. It was decided that a change of location was needed in order to improve reception. A new location was found, thus improving the signal immensely. Southside Radio can now be heard clearly in Counties Dublin and Wicklow and along most of the East Coast of Ireland.
